Now Available on OverDrive EBooks for Kindle

Ebooks for Amazon’s Kindle reader are now available through Shasta Public Libraries digital download service, OverDrive. The Kindle compatibility means that your library now provides digital media for all the major desktop and mobile devices, including Windows, Mac, iPod, iPhone, iPad, Sony Reader, NOOK, Android, BlackBerry and Windows Phone.



Ebooks aren’t the only material available for digital download. Audio books, movies and music are available for checkout and download. The process is easy, requiring a valid library card and access to a computer or mobile device.

To get started, visit the libraries website www.shastalibraries.org and click on Digital Media. Look through the *Quick Start Guide* and browse the media types and titles available. There’s a *Checkout Assistance* button or you can call the library with any questions.

You can enjoy digital titles anytime, anywhere. And not to worry: the library will still have “hard” copies of material to check out the old-fashioned way!

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eScrip Donations Continue BFREF Helping Library With Funding

In response to Safeway’s decision to limit its donations to school-related groups instead of charitable organizations like the Friends of the Intermountain Libraries, the Burney—Fall River Education Foundation has partnered with FOIL. If you register your Safeway card and designate BFREF as your group, the funds generated will be given to the Burney Branch of Shasta Libraries.

For the past 10 years FOIL received donations through the eScrip organization from our supporters who shop at Safeway with their FOIL-registered Safeway cards. It’s such an easy way to donate most folks don’t even realize they’re doing it – the donations come directly from Safeway with no cost to the shoppers. FOIL has used these funds to develop a broad, relevant and up-to-date children’s collection.



In May’s newsletter FOIL reported that as of June 30 Safeway would no longer support non-school affiliated organizations through its participation in the eScrip program. Safeway hasn’t stopped donating; but since FOIL is a library group and not a school group, FOIL is not eligible to participate. The loss will be significant: over \$5,000 per year came to the library through your shopping with Safeway. Currently all of the donations that *would* be generated by your shopping at Safeway are not going to any group.

FOIL reported that supporters could contact eScrip and direct their donations to another group, and that’s what FOIL would like all its supporters

to do right now. The Burney - Fall River Education Foundation is eligible to receive Safeway's eScrip donations and they have very generously partnered with the Burney Library to send the money generated by supporters shopping to FOIL for the Burney Library Children's Collection. FOIL is tremendously grateful for their support.

You can go online to www.escrip.com and sign in. You'll be asked to provide one of the following: your supporter ID, your email address, your phone number or the number on your Safeway card. Once you've signed in to *MyEScrip* you can click on *Change My Group Selection*. Enter the group ID number **500029741**: that's the Burney-Fall River Education Foundation.

Don't want to go online? Call the library and say "Sign me up!" All that's needed is the number on the front of your red Safeway card. Lost the card? Safeway will give you a new one just for the asking.

You can also call anyone on the FOIL Board: President Cathy Coleman, Vice President Michelle McCammon, Secretary Kathy Urlie, Treasurer Mary Anne Pearson or members-at-large Adele Boster and especially Evalee Nelson. It was Evalee who worked tirelessly to set up the BFREF as an eScrip participant and partner with FOIL so that there would be little interruption in the flow of donations to the Library.

If you've never signed up before, FOIL needs you! Just contact the Library (335-4317) or one of the Board members and they'll take care of everything. There is absolutely no cost to you.

FOIL would like to extend a heart-felt THANK YOU to everyone who registered with eScrip for the Friends of the Intermountain Libraries. We hope you will redirect the money donated through shopping at Safeway to the Burney- Fall River Education Foundation so that Burney Library can continue to receive these much needed funds.

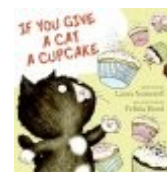
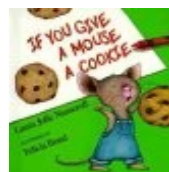
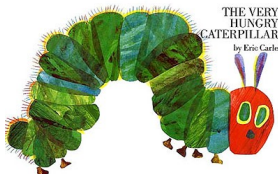
For Preschool Storytime at Burney Library

In Memoriam Eddie Cleckler

FOIL's Volunteer of the Year for 2003 was Eddie Cleckler. Being volunteer of a particular year doesn't tell the whole story though. Eddie helped the Burney Library for decades. He was available in sun and snow, day and night, often at a minute's notice. (It was real handy that he was married to the then-librarian, Connie.) He did it all with a smile & a quick joke.

Eddie died suddenly on August 3, 2011. No one will ever fill the void he left. He will be greatly missed.

Eddie did it all, and much more, for over 30 years. Retired from a career with Caltrans, even when he was working Eddie found time to do things for the Burney Library, including plowing snow. Of course, Eddie had a relative in library service: Burney's now-retired branch manager, Connie. For a lot of years it was, "Eddie would you..." from Connie and the Friends of the Library, and of course, he did whatever was asked. His aid to the library never stopped, nor did it waiver. He was also the library's liaison with the Burney Lions Club, of which he was a long-time member.

When he wasn't helping the Library or the Lions Eddie was found in his shop, "puttering", "making", and "fixing" for darn near everyone in town. All anyone had to say was, "Eddie, you know the doomajigee on the whatsis that make the thingamajig go? I need it", and if Eddie didn't have it he'd *make* it for you. Eddie always came through.

Eddie and Connie did get away from it all, escaping to Reno usually monthly. They took longer trips, also: they went to Arizona, England, Ireland, and Australia, where Eddie pursued his love of snorkeling.

The public recognition of Eddie Cleckler as Burney Library's Volunteer of the Year was long overdue. Eddie, we hope you knew how much we appreciated your wit and your humor and your help. And what we'll really miss saying is - if you have a minute, there's this thingee on the doohickey that needs.....

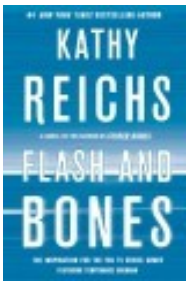

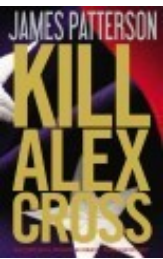
New @ Your Library

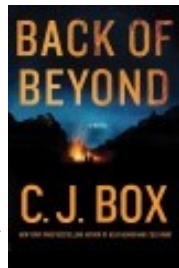
to the Texas border in last year's *Rain Gods*: Sheriff Hack Holland is back in *Feast Day*

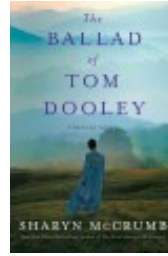

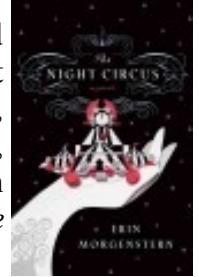
Back of Beyond, a thriller set in the back country of Montana. Laurie R. King's Mary Russell and Sherlock Holmes return in *Pirate King*. W. E. B. Griffin adds to his Honor Bound series with *Victory and Honor*.

Lev Grossman continues the story of Quentin, now High King of Fillory in *The Magician King*. To ease his ennui, Quentin embarks on a magical quest, where things go terribly wrong: think *Narnia* and *Harry Potter* for grownups.



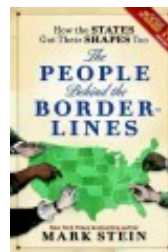
"Hang down your head Tom Dooley..." who doesn't know the classic American ballad? The song is based on actual events in post-Civil War Wilkes County North Carolina. Author Sharyn McCrumb's extensive research led to her new novel *The Ballad of Tom Dooley* that reveals the true story behind the song.

Two illusionists, Celia and Marco, are bound together in a contest with no rules. The winner will go on, the loser will not. It's a magical contest, set in a fantastical carnival world with strange and wonderful characters in *The Night Circus* by Erin Morgenstern.



More fantasy comes in *The Measure of the Magic* (Legends of Shannara) by Terry Brooks, sequel to his *Bearers of the Black Staff*. *The Omen Machine* by Terry Goodkind is a new novel in his Sword of Truth series.

New for non-fiction readers is the story of how the interstate highway system changed the face of the United States – from where we live to what we eat to how we think about time and distance. Earl Swift chronicles the events in *The Big Roads: The Untold Story of the Engineers, Visionaries, and Trailblazers Who Created the American Superhighways*.



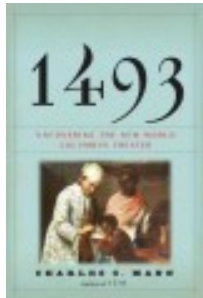
Mark Stein has more fascinating facts about our 50 states in *How the States Got Their Shapes Too: The People Behind the Borderlines*.

Dava Sobel, author of *Longitude & Galileo's Daughter* gives us *A More Perfect Heaven: How Copernicus Revolutionized the Cosmos*, another fascinating and elegantly written scientific study.





In his previous book *1491* Charles C. Mann examined North and South America pre-Columbus. In his new book he chronicles the changes brought about after the European “discovery” of America, and they are global and staggering. Through examinations of things like tobacco, the potato, guano, rubber plants, sugar cane, germs and insects, Mann shows us how the world came to be what it is now. *1493: Uncovering the New World Columbus Created* is full of fascinating and surprising information.



World by Amy Snyder takes us through the 2009 race without the pain and tears and sleep-deprivation but still leaves us exhausted and amazed at what the athletes endure.

Looking for something to do this winter? How about some home projects? New to the library are *Building Outdoor Structures* by Scott McBride and *Not So Big Remodeling: Tailoring Your Home for the Way You Really Live* by Sarah Susanka. Planning for next spring there is

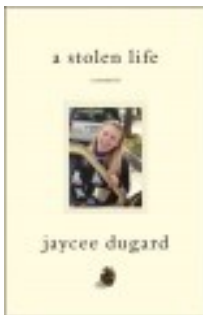


Home Outside: Creating the Landscape You Love by Julie Moir Messervy and *The New Low-Maintenance Garden: How to Have a Beautiful, Productive Garden and the Time to Enjoy It* by Valerie Easton and Jacqueline M. Koch.



“He was born in 1918, and he never died.” Rin Tin Tin was indeed a real dog, and in Susan Orlean’s *Rin Tin Tin: The Life and the Legend* we get the story of how he was found and his subsequent fame. Early silent movie star, spokesdog for the U.S. Army in WWII, then a TV star in the 1950’s, Rinty (and his descendants) became a symbol of bravery, loyalty and intelligence

Everyone has heard bits and pieces of the Jaycee Dugard story. Now she tells it herself in *A Stolen Life: A Memoir* by Jaycee Lee Dugard. Everyone’s also heard all the stories about the Rolling Stones but you’ll find new insights in *Jagger: Rebel, Rock Star, Rambler, Rogue* by Marc Spitz



Mainstream adult authors writing for the young adult market include John Grisham with his second Theodore Boone novel, *Theodore Boone: The Abduction* and Harlan Coben’s *Shelter: A Mickey Bolitar Novel* featuring Myron Bolitar’s nephew Mickey.



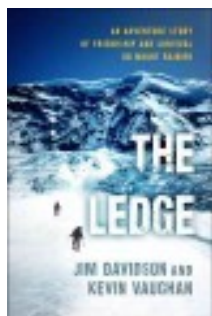
Stacey Jay has rewritten the story of Romeo and Juliet as a supernatural fantasy pitting good against evil in *Juliet Immortal*. Jael is another heroine with paranormal powers, this time battling demons in *Misfit* by Jon Skovron.



More paranormal fantasy novels include *Beautiful Chaos* (Beautiful Creatures, Book 3) by Kami Garcia and *Silence* (Hush, Hush Saga) by Becca Fitzpatrick.



New in science fiction is *Crossed: Book 2* in the Matched trilogy by Ally Condie.



Written 19 years after the accident, *The Ledge: An Adventure Story of Friendship and Survival on Mount Rainier* by Jim Davidson is a story of what went wrong and what the survivor went through and dealt with in the following years.

The Race Across America isn’t a well-known event: it’s a 3000-mile, 12-day bicycle ride. *Hell on Two Wheels: An Astonishing Story of Suffering, Triumph, and the Most Extreme Endurance Race in the*



Brian Selznick's *Wonderstruck* is two stories, one in prose and one in pictures, poignantly interwoven. More pictures than words, you'll be looking through its beautiful illustrations again and again. Set 50 years apart, the stories tell of a young boy's search for his father and

a girl's search for her idol. Both searches take them to New York City and the Museum of Natural History.

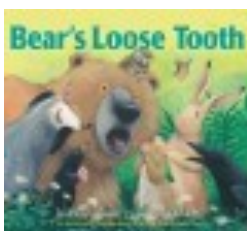
New realistic young adult novels are *Something Like Fate* and *So Much Closer* by Susane Colasanti,



Prom and Prejudice by Elizabeth Eulberg and *The Unwritten Rule* by Elizabeth Scott.



New picture books for kids of every age include two wonderful bears and one who's, well, very bear-like. Karma Wilson's *Bear's Loose Tooth* brings back Bear and all his woodland friends trying to deal with his wiggly-wobbly tooth.



In Bonnie Becker's *The Sniffles for Bear*, Mouse (small and grey and bright-eyed) is certain he can make his friend Bear as good as new with his relentlessly cheery music, singing and reading.

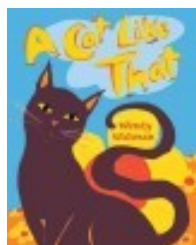
Bear is quite sure no one has ever been as ill as he, and resists Mouse's efforts all the way. It's a wonderful third book about the irritable curmudgeon and his effervescent little friend.

It's a simple premise: Bear's hat is gone, and he wants it back in *I Want My Hat Back* by Jon Klassen. Patiently and politely he asks all of the forest creatures if they've seen it, and they all say no. But...someone has misled Bear, who then exacts revenge.



Sniffles are the topic of the moment as Anna Dewdney's Llama Llama has throat tickles and throat scratches in *Llama Llama Home with Mama*. Starting to feel a little better by lunchtime he finds he knows just what to do when Mama starts to sneeze.

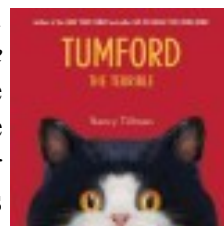
Think your substitute teacher was bad? Wait until you meet Chris Gall's *Substitute Creacher*. He tells the sad tales of kids who didn't follow the rules, like Keith the glue-eater, Zach the daydreamer, and Hank the prankster.



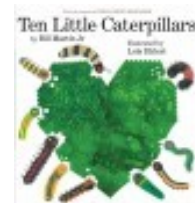
A perfect book for teaching children how to gently take care of their pet is *A Cat Like That* by Wendy Wahman. *Tumford the Terrible* by Nancy Tillman shows us all the ways a small cat can cause lots of trouble without meaning to.



Won Ton: A Cat Tale Told in Haiku by Lee Wardlaw tells the story of a wary shelter cat settling into his new home.

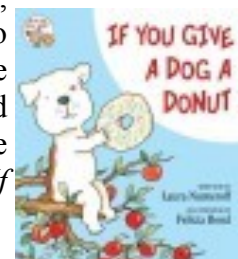


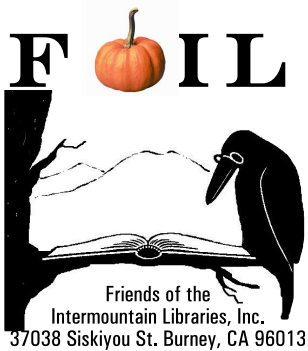

Ten Little Caterpillars is a vibrant new rhyming book by Bill Martin Jr. and Lois Ehlert. "If you give a dog a donut,

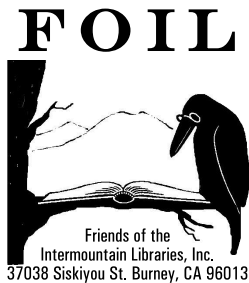
